Title	Literature and Exile			
Course type	Seminar

Description	In recent years literary texts on exile and migration have been increasing. This seminar seeks to examine how contemporary German literature draws upon or relates to previous topoi and narratives of exile, especially literature written during the Nazi regime 1933-1945. Putting both time frames into a productive dialogue, the seminar's structure is twofold: First, we will read canonical texts by authors who fled Nazi-Germany, such as Brecht, Mann, Musil, Roth, Seghers, and Zweig. Then, we will discuss how contemporary writers with migration backgrounds, including Irena Brezna, Olga Grjasnowa, Abbas Khider, and Saša Stanišić, explore questions of displacement and abandonment. With which means do literary texts shape and construct (or question and deconstruct) notions of memory and identity? What linguistic, disciplinary, genre, historical, and cultural shifts does the transgression of national borders produce? And, finally, how can we read 'exile' as a mental state or a poetological concept? Complemented by theoretical and philosophical texts (Arendt, Agamben, etc.), the seminar addresses these questions with regards to German-Jewish contexts, postcolonial and gender studies, and trauma theory. In teaching we will employ the culture-general approach. The knowledge the students will gain is universal and can be used for the management of any kind of intercultural encounters, e. g. German-Russian, German-French, German-Chinese etc. We will guide the students towards the skill of connecting theoretical knowledge with its practical implementation in real-life situations. Description	The seminar will focus on stereotypes and their influence on intercultural encounters. The following topics will be addressed: introduction into stereotype theories origin, characteristics and functions of stereotypes stereotypes are a complex social phenomenon that can be an obstacle to efficient communication learning to manage stereotyped cultural knowledge in a competent, reflexive and realistic way We will guide students to relate the theoretical knowledge about stereotypes to its implementation in real-life interactions with individuals from a differing cultural background. Title	Smart phone video documentation of my exchange semester at LMU			
Course type	Exercise/Section ("Übung")

Details	2 Hours/week	3 ECTS	Summer semester	
Description	The course addresses exchange students who will produce and postproduce a short video with their own mobile devices (smartphones) in order to document their exchange semester at LMU. Course structure: The course will provide input on topics such as smartphone video technology, accessories and equipment, film making apps, image setup, sound, mobile storytelling, storyboard development as well as postproduction via Final Cut Pro X. Before independently applying their film making skills, students will create their own storyboard, on which they will receive individual feedback from LMU eUniversity (Marcel Büssing, Stephan Kulla). Students will then shoot their own film in small groups, based on interviews and scenes which are particularly characteristic for their exchange semester at LMU. Students will then postproduce the video based on their footage. There is a chance that the videos will be shown on the website of LMU. Prerequisites: The course offers 12 places for exchange students at LMU. Six places are foreseen for Sociology students, the remaining six will be offered to Communications and Political Sciences students (and from other fields if enough places are available). The course is open for students with and without prior mobile film making skills! When applying for the course, please specify if you already have mobile film making experience."
